Seeds, Seeds!

It's that time of year, when you're tired of the cold and grey, and one of the comforts of the season is a cup of something warming and a stack of seed and nursery catalogs. As you begin to plan your garden for the coming year, here's a surprise new resource to keep in mind for a selection of open-pollinated vegetable and flower seeds: your public library.

Beginning soon, every library in Rock County will have seeds you can check out with no due date! Several varieties of tomatoes. Green and purple beans. Peas. Dill and cilantro. Peppers. Sunflowers. Zinnias. And each library will have at least a few books on seed saving, plus additional flyers, handouts and detailed growing information to go along with the seeds themselves. Borrowers are encouraged (though not required) to save some seed to return to the seed bank and help keep the program going. For more information, see http://als.lib.wi.us/seedlibrary.html.

Coinciding with the rollout of the program, several MGVs are developing a talk on starting seeds indoors, which will be given for the first time at Hedberg Public Library on Feb. 27 (see below), and at the Edgerton Public Library on March 18, and at other libraries as requested. The outline of this talk, handouts and materials will also be available for any MGV to use.

As winter winds on in Wisconsin, the 25th-annual Wisconsin Public Television Garden Expo could offer you a bit of spring-like warmth and lots of chances to get in some education hours.

Garden Expo offers more than 150 seminars and demos on topics such as everything you need to know about jumping worms, how to grow the best tomatoes, floral arranging, fermenting vegetables, and landscaping your way to a dry basement. Most are free (after your entry and parking fees) and don't require pre-registration, though a few hands-on workshops do.

Highlighted speakers for the event: WPT's Around the Farm Table host Inga Witscher, nationally-known gardening expert Melinda Myers, Wisconsin author Jerry Apps, Wisconsin Public Radio's Larry Meiller, United Kingdom-based "Mr. Plant Geek" Michael Perry, garden blogger and author of Kiss My Aster: A Graphic Guide to Creating a Fantastic Yard Totally Tailored to You Amanda Thomsen, award-winning garden educator, and author and design consultant Kerry Ann Mendez. Tapping Trees to Make Syrup, with Dave Bendlin. Saturday, Feb 24, 1-2:30 p.m. \$20/\$15 members. Registration required by Feb. 21. Did you know? Wisconsin is one of the largest producers of maple syrup in the United States! Syrup production takes place largely in the central and northern counties of the state, this is where native sugar maples are most common. But — there are other trees that can be tapped to make syrup here in southern Wisconsin! The most common of these is the Box Elder Tree and the syrup that can be made from its sap has a delicious flavor which is comparable to maple syrup.

In this program, Dave Bendlin will guide you through the steps of tapping trees, collecting their sap and cooking the sap down into syrup. If the syrup making

season has progressed well, there will be samples for you to taste and possibly even purchase (cash only).

If weather permits, we will go outdoors to tap trees; please dress for the weather. Bring a 1 gallon plastic milk or water jug (no juice containers please). <u>You should rinse out and air out your gallon jug before attending.</u>

Prairie Seed Processing: Thursday, February 8, 5:30-7:00 p.m. Check the blog (rpmga.blogspot.com) for location. Rather than an education program, this is a volunteer opportunity to help process seeds collected from a local prairie. We'll use them later as part of RPMGA's ongoing pollinator project.

Starting Seeds for Your Garden: Hedberg Public Library, Tuesday, Feb. 27, 6-7:30 p.m. Free and open to the public.

Starting seeds for your garden is much less expensive than buying nursery grown sets, and often gives you many more choices. It's generally very easy, and can be highly rewarding. In this program, a team of Master Gardener Volunteers (MGVs) will teach the fine points of starting seeds at home. The class will start with choosing the appropriate plants from seed catalogs, will address how to assemble and use the proper equipment and explain the process of choosing and setting up a dedicated location in the home. Once the students have experienced the process for the first time, they can go forward into the future using purchased or saved seeds to start sets each year.

We will explain what equipment the students will need, give advice on how to choose seeds, provide documentation on when to start the chosen seeds, and give a brief presentation on how to test seed viability by germination testing prior to planting. During the last half hour of the class attendees will also be able to do hands-on seed starting in mini-greenhouse kits which they can take home with them.
