



# Master Gardener Update July 2020

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#### **Virtual Visit**

### **Bookworm Gardens, Sheboygan**

RPMGA meetings and tours are still on hold. So we continue to bring you virtual tours of some gardens that we either would—or could—have visited. This month we bring you one of Wisconsin's newest botanical gardens.

Fifteen years ago a resident of Sheboygan, Sandy Livermore, had an idea. She wanted to create a botanical

garden based on children's books.

She began work on the idea, and for the next eleven years worked on assembling a group of committed individuals to help her get it off the ground. A board of directors was assembled. To bring people into the plan the board gave presentations to groups whose focus was children's literature – book clubs, service groups, churches, businesses, foundations and individuals. The board applied for non-profit status.

Then came the heavy lifting – fund raising.

Together they raised 2.8 million dollars and with



the help of landscape architect Herb Schaal created the garden concept plan. Librarians, teachers and reading specialists compiled the book list that the gardens would be built from.

Before the doors were even opened a steady stream of volunteers began work to put this project together. For over a year volunteers worked to get the site ready. They cleared away dead, diseased and invasive species. Construction began in 2008. Over

1,000 people gave of their time, and talent to make the dream a reality.

Ten years ago, on October 16, 2010, Bookworm Gardens opened its gates to over 2,000 visitors. Since the beginning the gardens have partnered with over 20 other non-profits and educational organizations. The gardens are supported through memberships and volunteer hours

donated by local folks and local business partners.

The gardens are open May through October. There are over 70 individual "gardens" – all of which were inspired by the book list – many that you and I probably read as kids.

To say the gardens were a success is an understatement. To give you an idea how many folks Bookworm Gardens serves, let's look at their 2018 visitor statistics. Over 6, 000 children participated in the garden's field trip and camping programs. Over 5,800 adults participated in adult events and workshops. Over 10,000 people visited the garden's family festivals, and there were over 80,000 general visitors.

#### The Gardens Are Open!

#### Volunteering

Yes! Rotary Gardens has been approved as meeting the Covid 19 protocols set by the University of WI. So you can now volunteer as an MGV if you feel comfortable returning to this service. *Note:* Approval has been given for *only* those gardening tasks that can be done without much chance of public contact. You must maintain social distance. And you should bring your own tools, gloves and hand sanitizer. Rotary also has limits on the number of volunteers at any one time, and varied starting times. #### Ask a Master Gardener Facebook Live Sessions

These weekly on-line Q&A programs are up and running through both Hedberg and Aram (Delevan) Public Libraries! Each session has a topic for the week, with the top 5 things you should know about it, perhaps a pest of the week, and then questions from viewers. The programs remain available through the libraries' Facebook pages, so people can watch at their convenience. At the time this was written, the tomatoes program had 235 views at Hedberg and 341 views at Aram. The Pollinators program had 205 views at Hedberg within 5 days and



138 views at Aram after only 3 days! As you can tell from the numbers, this is a really good way to reach people.

Topics coming up: caring for your annuals, pests in the garden, and lawn care. You can volunteer to give a presentation, just be a member of the group answering questions, or work totally behind the scenes researching topics and following up on questions asked. Horticulture Outreach Specialist Julie Hill also welcomes comments, suggestions and ideas for additional topics. Sessions will continue throughout the summer: Wednesdays at 6:00 p.m. for Hedberg, Fridays at noon for Aram. #### **Covid-Approved Garden Work**

If you've been waiting for the green light to do some gardening as an MGV, you may now have the chance. Keep in mind, though, that there are still limitations:

The garden must meet Covid safety protocols set by the UW, including signage, social distancing and bringing your own tools and hand sanitizer. As of 6/29, approved gardens in Rock County are **Rotary Botanical Gardens** and the **pollinator garden at Hedberg Public Library**. Other gardens are in the approval process. Watch your email for more info, or contact Julie about getting approval for the garden you're interested in. You can also volunteer at approved gardens in Walworth County. As of 6/29, those include Town of Linn Memorial and Pollinator Garden, Phoenix School Community Garden, SMILES in Darien, Walworth County Gov't Building in Elkhorn, Lakeland Health Care Center in Elkhorn and Black Point Estate and Gardens near Lake Geneva.

#### **Virtual Chats Go Biweekly**

The virtual coffee/tea talks for Rock and Walworth County Master Gardeners are going to a new schedule. Instead of weekly, they will now take place on the 2<sup>nd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> Wednesdays of July and August. Julie Hill will continue to send out an email with a registration link at least two days before the meeting.

Anywhere from 15 to 25 people usually show up. Julie provides the latest updates from the Master Gardener Program Office and what's going on is Rock and Walworth Counties. There's usually lots of casual garden chat, and fun pictures. It's been great meeting some of our counterparts in Walworth County and getting to know each other more.

**Hate Zoom?** Most of the education opportunities these days do take place via Zoom or start with Zoom and stream it to Facebook or YouTube. If you're not comfortable with Zoom, you should know that all of the Level 2 Plants Plus topics at wimastergardener.org use only prerecorded videos and readings. They're always available, they're free, and if you complete all the readings, videos and quiz for a topic, you net 2 hours of continuing ed for that subject. Topics change, so check back every month or so. Articles are also available to read for a half hour of continuing ed in most cases.



## A Few of the Books Featured at Bookworm Gardens

**Goldilocks & the Three Bears by Jan Brett** - Everybody loves the story of the curious little girl named Goldilocks, who made herself quite at home in the house of the three bears. Jan Brett's lavish illustrations for this classic tale, full of details and surprises, gives this edition a special flair. Children will marvel at the enchanted world created herein.

Horton Hatches the Egg by Dr. Seuss - Everyone laughs when Horton the Elephant offers to sit on Mayzie bird's egg while she goes on holiday. Horton's kindness and faithfulness are sorely tested when he, and the egg, are kidnapped and sold to a circus - but his reward for being faithful is more wonderful than he could ever have dreamed!






Charlotte's Web by E.B. White - This beloved book by E. B. White, author of Stuart Little and The Trumpet of the Swan, is a classic of children's literature that is "just about perfect." This high-quality edition features vibrant illustrations colorized by Rosemary Wells! Some Pig. Humble. Radiant. These are the words in Charlotte's Web, high up in Zuckerman's barn. Charlotte's spider web tells of her feelings for a little pig named Wilbur, who simply wants a friend. They also express the love of a girl named Fern, who saved Wilbur's life when he was born the runt of his litter. E. B. White's Newbery Honor Book is a tender novel of friendship, love, life, and death that will continue to be enjoyed by generations to come.

A Sock Is a Pocket for Your Toes by Elizabeth Garton Scanlon This delightful verse is captured in energetic artwork, which follows four families through a busy day exploring the surprising ins and outs of the world's

pockets. This special book will leave readers young and old with pockets full of joy! A cave is a pocket for a bear, a breath is a pocket full of air. A hat is a pocket for your hair, and a seat is a pocket called a chair.... Illustrated by Robin Preiss Glasser.





**Goodnight Moon by Margaret Wise Brown** - In a great green room, tucked away in bed, is a little bunny. "Goodnight room, goodnight moon." And to all the familiar things in the softly lit room -- to the picture of the three little bears sitting on chairs, to the clocks and his socks, to the mittens and the kittens, to everything one by one -- the little bunny says goodnight.

The Magic School Bus Plants Seeds by Joanna Cole - Ms. Frizzle's class is growing a beautiful garden. But, Phoebe's plot is empty. Her flowers are back at her old school! So, the class climbs aboard the Magic School Bus. And, of course, the kids don't only go back to Phoebe's school, but they go inside one of Phoebe's flowers! Follow the kids' adventure and learn how living things grow.


